Today, YLOs ensure police meet their legislative responsibilities in relation to the *Young Offenders Act 1997* which became effective in April 1998.

The Act aims to divert young people from the juvenile justice system and provides guidelines to achieve this. It gives police four ways to deal with offenders aged 10 to 17 years:

Additionally, the Youth Liaison Officer might:

- undertake innovative problem solving with young people to reduce youth
 crime and victimisation
- implement and coordinate crime reduction programs
- coach other police to interact effectively with young people and network
 with other agencies and community groups
- support the Police Service's Youth Policy Statement
- · represent the Service at youth related community forums and meetings.
