(Extracts from) FEBRUARY NEWSLETTER:

News from BK13:

- It has come to our attention that the NSW NHW Movement was started some 20 years ago this year.
- It begs the question is the NHW movement still as effective as it was when created?
- What has changed in the last 20 years of NSW NHW operation?
- In the year that the NHW Movement was created, we saw the introduction of the Personal Computer (PC).
- The introduction of the computer based Word Processing programs soon made the manual and electronic typewriters redundant.
- Our Council's Library Index Cards boxes which stored details about each library book and who the book was loaned to - was replaced with a Computer based database storage repository.
- In the mid 1990, we saw the introduction of the Email messaging system and access to the Internet Information System.
- The Mobile Telephone, SMS message systems and Emails Services are slowly replacing our fixed line telephone and Faxes.
- We are knocking down single owner dwelling and replaced them with multi-unit dwellings.

- We have been replacing our neighbour's 1.6 metre high wooden fences with 1.8 metre high Colorbond fences. This prevents us from saying 'good day' to our neighbours over our back fences we can only speak to our neighbours if we should see them out the front.
- On 9th January we heard about a person who had passed away at Yagoona and was not discovered for about 12 months.
- A Christian Religion minister, stated on ABC Radio, that he lives in a multi-storey housing complex and his building's computerised security access key only allowed him to access his floor from the building's lift. He can only knock on 3 or 4 neighbour's doors, on his floor.
- When this minister goes for his morning exercise, he has noticed that when he says 'good day' to other people these people look at him in a very funny way.

In the days before Television sets, we spoke to

our neighbours, invited them in for a 'cup of tea'

and offered to help

when needed.

These days we lock ourselves away

in our homes.

Assisting Our Elderly Neighbours

Using the experience gained from the death of our elderly neighbour at Yagoona, early this year, the Neighbourhood Watch movement may be able to advise our elderly neighbours about obtaining aids/devices to protect themselves as they age.

The Government's current policy is to "HOLD" aged people and **people with a disability**, in their homes for a longer period of time. This is being done by providing Carer Assistance (a family member, friend or neighbour). With the elderly, as they age, now discovering that they may injure themselves in their homes much more easily, there is a need to make available an 'Assistance Base' that can be access by these people when needed.
