CRIME DISCUSSION

Whilst crime review was taking place several discussions with regard to Locking/unlocking of credit card. Enquiries revealed that it is up to the individual credit card as to what settings are available. Frauds on line and over the phone. These need to be reported to Police and Scamwatch.

Drug operations were discussed at length. Covert operations, resources used, money spent. **Supt FEHON**: Heroin in lower socio economic areas. Continued focus on drug supply.

Sgt SAINSBURY: On the MNC for the first time there were more Random drug testing charges than Random Breath testing charges.

GENERAL BUSINESS

R PENNEY I wish to inform the meeting of the North Coast Area Health Service Innovation Awards that are being held in Port Macquarie in June that the Health Literacy Program run at Farringdon Village which included Constable CHERRY has made it to the top 3.

SUPT FEHON mentioned that a new mental health initiative for patients deemed possible suffering mental illness be assessed within 45 minutes of attending Macksville Hospital. Funding has been approved for this project. Coffs Harbour, Port Macquarie, Kempsey currently have declared facilities..

MAYOR HOBAN/ J GUY mentioned issues about a group of 5 to 6 kids and teens that are terrorising people in the Macksville area by throwing rocks and smashing windows, shoplifting, trespassing, offensive behaviour etc etc.

(Names of these juveniles were given to Police at end of meeting. Enquiries by the YLO revealed the majority of these youths came from one or two families in the area. Youth on Track and Mission Australia are both involved with one of these families and Police are making further enquiries.)

INSP K FEHON Explained in a brief version the Young Offenders Act with regard to warnings, cautions, conference and charge/court. If they continue they need to go to juvenile detention.

SUPT FEHON Police advise all members of the community that they need to report crime so that Police can do something about it. Youth on Track is a program that offers intervention in breaking the cycle of crime committed by Youth.

Kempsey, Macksville and Bellingen are going back to their own Court Circuit.
