

Call Triple Zero 000 in an emergency





An **emergency** is

- when a person's life is in danger
- when property is in danger.

For example, someone has a knife and is stealing from you.

It is important to call Triple Zero 000 in an emergency.



Calls to Triple Zero 000 are recorded.

You will be asked if you want

- police
- fire

or

ambulance.







Say **police** to report a crime.



You **must**

- stay on the phone
- stay calm
- answer the questions
- speak clearly.

The operator will ask

- your name
- where you are
 - the street name and number
 - the names of streets nearby
 - other landmarks.



In country areas you must give

- the full address. Do **not** give the property name only.
- names of nearby places and landmarks.



When you are on the motorway you must give information about





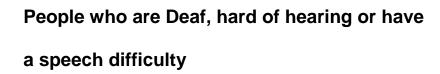
exits you have passed.



Do **not** hang up. Wait for the operator to tell you to hang up.

You might need to meet police at an organised place.

For example, at the police station.
