# 1. Meeting opened at The Hills Shire Council Chambers at 10:05am

# 1. Matters arising from last meeting:

# 1. Faye HANSEN / Shirley PURSER to provide update on White Ribbon Day preparations

White Ribbon Day preparations for Monday 25<sup>th</sup> November are well on the way. The stall at Castle Towers will be situated outside Event Cinemas at and Castle Hill High School students will help out. Stalls will also be located at Bunnings Castle Hill and Dural. And another site to be confirmed at the Towers. Police are looking at holding the morning BBQ just outside the main entrance off Old Castle Hill Road to attract the morning commuters.

On the Tuesday 26<sup>th</sup> November is the Healthy Relationships Forum which is being organised by Soroptimist International and strongly supported by the Domestic Violence Prevention Committee. Ken NATHAN and Faye HANSEN will both be speaking about healthy relationships. Possibly will run from 9am – 3pm.

Please support White Ribbon Day in every way you can and for the gentlemen present could you please sign up on the website as advocates. Dominic PERROTTET will be holding a function at the Castle Hill RSL however the details haven't been finalised.

# 2. Crime Prevention Forums

So far we have held four crime prevention forums and they have been a great success. Our recent forum was:

# 3. Charles MEADER to provide dog attack statistics

Charles has been sick and has been off work for some time.

Gaynor CORFIELD provided the statistics:

From 1 July 2013 until 31 October 2013 there have been 30 dog attacks. 21 on animals and 17 on human victims (some attacks involved more than one victim).

Out of the attacks most serious was 3 dogs died and two people were hospitalised.

# 4. Supt. CRITCHLOW mentioned RBT statistics

Our September statistics were 941 tests conducted, however October has seen a significant increase with 3,128 tests conducted so now the bar has been set. Injury crashes have decreased from 27 to 23 for the month. And we will definitely be reinforcing the community interaction, especially for young constables. Ian FENELEY stated that Police are now enjoying a very positive public profile and the more we can keep it up there the better.

#### 4. Crime Report

A general discussion was also held on the crime statistics – presentation delivered to the meeting by Inspector Jim SZABO and on current crime trends.

#### **Non-DV Assaults**

There were 60 non-domestic violence assaults in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2013 and 82 assaults in the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter of 2013 showing a decrease of 27%.

- 29% of incidents occurred in Residential Premises, 24% of incidents occurred in Licensed Premises, 19% on Business Premises and 13% in an Outdoor/Public Place.
- The main hot spots for Non DV Assaults remain unchanged and are focused on Rouse Hill & Castle Hill CBD.
- Licensed premises continue to be the main focus of business inspections to reduce alcohol related assaults. The Command is working with the Licensees to reduce offences on Licensed Premises.

Usually we find with alcohol and warmer weather we have more assaults. We are looking about 24 per month.

#### **DV** Assaults

There were 70 domestic violence assaults recorded in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2013 and 57 for the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter of 2013 showing a decrease of 18%.

- The decrease in DV Assaults is a result of Police working with the operators.
- Police time spent in group homes has dropped by over 80% since January 2013.
   There has been a corresponding decrease in the number of missing person reports.
- DV Assaults remains a Command priority with all incidents reviewed by the Senior Management Team on a daily basis.
- Supervisors are attending all domestic violence assault matters.
- The Command is participating in activities to raise the public's awareness about Domestic Violence.

57 for this quarter has been a decrease come about by Supt. CRITCHLOW emphasising to our general duties supervisors that they must attend every DV incident. Over the weekend we have been looking at current stats and in the last 20 incidents the supervisors have attended all but one of the incidents.

Ian FENELY stated that the community's appreciation needs to be expressed to Police for the work we do when dealing with DV victims.

With our stats, having less reports may be either a good thing or a bad thing. There may be fewer incidents however, there may just be less people reporting incidents.

Ian FENELY asked what the studies show in relation to the status of someone's mortgage and the rate of DV. Faye stated that social pressures are not enough for violence, it occurs over all socio economic groups. Supt. CRITCHLOW stated that the offending rates are universal however, the reporting rates are cultural and the language barrier can be one reason why a lot of Non English Speaking Background victims don't report DV.

Faye questioned how many offenders would be adolescents. We have not provided the stats here but will have them for the next forum.

We want the message out there that victims of domestic violence should be reporting to us so we want the figures to go up.

# Break, Enter & Steal

There were 180 Break and Enters recorded in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2013 and 165 incidents in the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter showing a 8% decrease.

- Hotspots for crimes move constantly. The main hot spots have been in Beaumont Hills, Castle Hill, Baulkham Hills, Carlingford and West Pennant Hills.
- Criminals focusing on credit cards which they use to commit frauds. They also target other small, high value items such as jewellery, wallet and handbags.
- Offences on non-residential premises has increased. Offenders are targeting shops for cash and cigarettes.
- Aggravated offences have decreased.
- Police have significantly reduced the number of offences in the hotspots of West Pennant Hills and Beaumont Hills with high profile patrols and community engagement.

Baulkham Hills is hot at the moment. Aggravated B&Es have been fluctuating and are down at the moment.

# **Major Motor Vehicle Accidents**

There were 350 major MVAs in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2013 and 339 incidents in the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter 2013 showing and insignificant decrease.

- The Hills LAC is focusing on RBT for the effects it has on both road trauma and property crime.
- Incident rates have remained reasonably static for several years in the Command but are now showing an upward trend due to increased traffic volume. Police expect changes to accident rates caused by the major works taking place in the Command.
- Main hot spots are centred around CBD of Castle Hill and major roads with particular emphasis on entry and exit ramps of freeways.
- The main black spots are the M2 Mtwy near Windsor Rd and the M2 Mtwy near

Pennant Hills Rd.

Castle Hill and Carlingford at the moment especially with Pennant Hills Road being one of the busiest roads in Australia. There has been a slight decrease and hopefully this is related to the increase in RBT. With the building of the Rail Way and more and more people moving into the Shire we will be looking at an increase in incidents.

Ian FENELY stated that it would be a miracle if the stats can be kept as low and the Police are doing a great job keeping it as low as it is now.

Keith TOPOLSKI asked what our numbers looked like around Christmas and New Year. Supt. CRITCHLOW stated that looking at the Control Chart we don't have a great increase, it is just mainly in the holiday locations such as the Central Coast.

### **Malicious Damage**

There were 245 Malicious Damage incidents reported in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of 2013. There were 245 incidents reported in the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter 2013 showing an 11% decrease.

- Egging is of particular concern with houses and vehicles targeted.
- Vehicles parked in residential areas are frequently targeted.
- Graffiti is still a problem. 20% of all reported incidents were graffiti. There is obviously a large number of unreported incidents.
- Random attacks on cars is also a problem. Windscreens are smashed, paint scratched and panels are dented.
- Offence rates have remained steady for some time.

Eggings are on the increase and also tyres being slashed in residential locations. These seem to be linked to licensed premises and may be intoxicated patrons are causing this issue. Graffiti is pretty much static. The long term trend is downwards.

# Stealing

There were 358 Stealing incidents in the  $2^{nd}$  quarter of 2013. There were 381 incidents in the  $3^{nd}$  quarter of 2013 showing a 6% increase.

- Shop lifting hot spots remain centred on the two main shopping Centres, Castle Towers and Rouse Hill Town Centre.
- Offenders are now targeting vehicles with wallets and handbags left in vehicles and then using stolen credit cards to commit fraud.
- Stolen vehicle registration plates continue to account for 8% of all property types stolen. A small number of these plates are used in Fail To Pay for Petrol.
- Steal from Motor Vehicle accounts for 44% of all stealing offences.
- CCTV is a useful tool to Police. Most stealing offences that occur in retail areas are captured on CCTV.

The amount of SFMV is quite high for the area and people are simply leaving highly valuable items in vehicles which often are not locked. We have recently arrested and charged offenders from Seven Hills, Mays Hill and North Richmond. Unfortunately the Mays Hill male was granted bail and then was caught only a couple days later committing the same offences and charged a second time.

Ian FENELY asked what the percentages of vehicles broken into have been unlocked. Supt. CRITCHLOW stated that we have done so much already trying to inform the public to lock their vehicles. Insp SZABO stated that in Eastwood LAC the CPO will go through the shopping centre car parks and check if cars are open and then leave a note with the vehicle. The Hills VIPs conduct car park patrols and send out letters to residents if valuables are left in their vehicle.

The main shopping centres are pretty good with CCTV however the majority of offences have been occurring in residential locations. Supt. CRITCHLOW stated that the issue may be that residents who are home feel that their vehicle is secure when it is located in the driveway and simply don't think they need to lock their vehicles.

# **Drugs**

Drugs have not been a big issue in our area so have not been reporting here however we have recently conducted a drug dog operation in the area. David ONEIL stated that he would have a drug dog every day at the Castle Hill RSL if possible.

Shirley PURSER questioned if a lot of the offenders are drug affected. Supt. CRITHCLOW stated that alcohol is still the major drug.
