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## VERTEBRATE PEST ANIMAL CONTROL GENUINE REASON

All persons wishing to obtain a firearms licence in NSW must have a genuine reason to obtain the licence.

This fact sheet provides information on the requirements for obtaining a firearms licence for the genuine reason of Vertebrate Pest Animal Control (VPAC).

### What requirements must be met for this Genuine Reason?

This genuine reason applies to a person who wishes to use firearms for the control or suppression of vertebrate pest animals.

There are three different types of VPAC genuine reasons:

- 1. A professional contract shooter engaged or employed to control vertebrate pest animals on rural land, or
- 2. An authorised officer or employee of a prescribed government agency, or
- 3. A primary producer participating in an authorised eradication campaign run by or on behalf of a government agency or public authority to eradicate large feral animals or animals affected by brucellosis or tuberculosis.

## What categories of licence are available for this Genuine Reason?

Categories A, B, D. Category D incorporates any firearm to which a category C licence applies.

Any person wishing to make application for a licence over and above a category A licence must also produce evidence of a special need.

The online application has provision for completion of a special need. Select a reason from the options provided which most closely describes your special need to possess or use the selected firearm category.

#### What evidence could I provide to support that I satisfy the requirements for this Genuine Reason?

## **Professional Contract Shooter**

At least one document from each of List 1 and List 2 identified below is suggested. If intending to conduct aerial shooting, all documents from List 3 should be provided in addition.

## List 1

- A current Australian Company or Business Name registration
- A Certificate of Currency/Certificate of Insurance issued by an Insurer for the purposes of pest management (VPAC)
- Recognised qualifications in VPAC

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### List 2

- Most recent tax assessment notice, less than 2 years old, or a declaration certified by a registered tax agent or qualified accountant confirming your occupation as a professional contract shooter
- Contracts or agreements from clients confirming the engagement of your services, including the name and contact details of the client, term of the engagement, and the type of animals to be eradicated
- \* Three (3) most recent pay advice from an employer who operates a business controlling vertebrate pest animals on rural land
- A contract/letter of employment confirming employment in a business controlling vertebrate pest animals on rural land

#### List 3

- \* Approval from the Civil Aviation Authority (CASA)
- \* Recognised qualifications for aerial shooting related to pest control

## Person employed in, or authorised by, a prescribed government agency

A letter from the prescribed government agency certifying that you are employed or authorised by them to control or suppress vertebrate pest animals on property controlled by the agency. The letter must be on official letterhead and include your details, the employer's details, describe the animal/pest to be controlled/suppressed, the property location and size and the type of firearms required (category A, B, D) to carry out these activities.

Prescribed government agencies for the purpose of the genuine reason of vertebrate pest animal control are:

- Department of Planning, Industry and Environment
- Local Land Services
- Border Fence Maintenance Board

#### Primary producer – authorised eradication campaign

A declaration from the authorised agency (e.g. Local Land Services) on behalf of which you are participating in an authorised eradication campaign, stating that the agency has declared that an eradication campaign is in force for a given period of time and the location of the primary producer's property.

Proof of primary producer status if you don't already hold a category A, category B or category C firearms licence, with the genuine reason: primary production. This could include:

- A current Primary Producer Declaration issued by Transport for NSW
- \* A Primary Producer Declaration certified by a registered tax agent or qualified accountant within the last 12 months
- \* Most recent tax assessment notice, less than 2 years old
- \* A letter from the Australian Taxation Office, less than 2 years old

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In addition to producing evidence of a special need as outlined above, an applicant for this genuine reason is also required to provide evidence as to why this activity cannot be met by any other means (for example, including by the authority conferred by a category A, category B or category C licence, or by engaging the services of a professional contract shooter). This evidence should be unique to your specific circumstances.

<u>Note</u>: The holder of a category D licence issued for the genuine reason of vertebrate pest animal control - primary producer authorised eradication campaign can apply to acquire three category D firearms only.

This licence is issued for a 12 month, 2 year or 5 year term and the above documentation must be uploaded with each application.
