## 6. OVERVIEW OF CURRENT CRIME TRENDS

Discussed by D/Insp Robert Allison for the period of 1<sup>st</sup> June to 31<sup>st</sup> August 2019

### Break and Enter Dwelling

- Rockdale, Peakhurst and Riverwood most were the most targeted areas
- Peak hours between 9am – 12pm and 3pm – 6pm
- Peak days Friday closely followed by Saturday and Sunday
- Currency were the most common proceeds followed by necklaces and power tools.
- Portable / small equipment mobile phones / wallets / handbags
- Mountain bikes

### Break and Enter Non-Dwelling

- Hurstville, Kingsgrove/Oatley/Peakhurst were locations where offences were more prevalent.
- Days / times where offences were more common were Thursday and Saturday between 3am and 6am, 12pm to 6.00pm and 9.00pm to 12.00am.
- Proceeds of offences were mainly copper, cash / currency, lap tops.

## **Assault (Alcohol Related Non DV)**

- Over this current reporting period Hurstville, Kogarah and Bexley were the locations recording most offences with Wednesdays and Sundays between 3pm and 9pm the most common reported.
- Outdoor / public place followed by residential and commercial / business were the places where most offences were alleged to have occurred. Personal Violence was the most prominent associated factor.
- Alcohol related assaults continue to be reported in increased numbers with offences alleged to have occurred at licensed premises accounting for 149 total reported offences for 3 months period (01/06/2019 to 31/08/2019).

## **Robbery**

- Wolli Creek and Hurstville were areas where the majority of offences were reported.
- Time frames which were most common for offences being reported were Tuesday, Saturday and Sunday (bet. 9pm and 12am)
- Reported offences occurred predominantly in outdoor / public places with the footpath and road being the most common areas.
- Robbery by physical force were the most frequently reported MO followed by knives / fist.
- Cash / currency and mobile phones were the most common proceeds of offences.

## **Steal from Motor Vehicle**

- Riverwood, Hurstville and Mortdale were areas more prone to these offences. Saturday and Sunday (bet.6pm and 9pm) were time / days where a pattern is identified.
- Analysis of these results would suggest the opportunistic offences have been replaced with forced entry / stealing of number plates.
- Cash/documents were the most common proceeds followed by number plates and personal items.
- At least 25% of offences reported would appear through MO to have been committed on unlocked / unsecured vehicles.
- Initiatives implemented so people are not victims of Steal from motor vehicle: Posting on St George PAC Facebook page

## **Stolen Vehicles**

- Toyota, Hyundai and Mitsubishi were particularly targeted and largely include vehicles not recovered.
- In this period Beverly Hills and Wolli Creek closely followed by Arncliffe, Brighton Le sands and Kogarah were locations subject to more offence. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday (between 3pm to 12.00am) were noted time / date patterns.

## **Malicious Damage**

- Hurstville, Brighton Le Sands and Kogarah were the most popular areas with Fridays and Saturdays between 3.00pm to 12.00am being the most targeted days/time.

## **Drug Detections**

- Riverwood, Hurstville, Rockdale and Wolli Creek (main transport hubs) were the areas where drug detection was targeted
- Thursday and Friday being the locations where most of the drugs were detected between 3.00pm to 6.00pm and 9.00pm to 12.00am

## **Drug Supply**

- 23 compass incidents
- 72 incidents with Legal Action Rate (LAR)
- 72.73% LAR
- Sans Souci followed by Riverwood were the suburbs under notice between 9.00am to 12.00pm

## **Fatal / Serious MVA's**

- Kogarah, Bexley, Hurstville, Brighton Le Sands and Rockdale were the most prevalent suburbs with Kings Georges Road and Princes Hwy being major roads for collisions.
- Major arterial roads.
- Tuesday and Monday, between 3.00pm to 6.00pm the peak times.

## 7. Traffic and Highway Patrol, St George HWP

Presented by Sgt Daniel Moore

- **Discussed the role of HWP**
  - Ensure the free flow of traffic
  - Encourage voluntarily compliance of the NSW road rules
  - High visibility policing methods to reduce and prevent road trauma
  - Detect offences and take appropriate action
  
- **Types of shifts**
  - Regular shift
  - Local RMS EEP funded shift
  - Statewide EEP Operation – Long Weekends etc
  - Region EEP funded Operations
  - EEP Funded Regional Trips
  
- **Stats for St George HWP**
  - They form the Sutherland HWP Cluster. They have authorised strength of 25 staff working out of Riverwood
  
- **January – July 2019**
  - 46828 breath tests conducted
  - 467 people put before the courts
  - 8522 infringement notices issued
  - 140 PCA & DUI detected
  - 181 drug drivers detected
  
- **In Car Video**
  - All cars are fitted with ICV (In Car Video)
  - All marked cars are fitted with ANPR (mobile automated number plate recognition)
  
- **NSW HWP Vehicle Equipment**
  - Mobile Data Terminal (MDT)
  - In-Car Video (ICV)
  - Mobile Automated Number Plate Recognition (MANPR)
  - Radar – mobile and stationary speed enforcement
  
- **2019 Fatals in St George PAC**
  - 9 killed in 6 collisions
  - Driver: 2

- Passenger: 2
- Motor Cycle rider: 2
- Motor Cycle pillion: 2
- Pedestrian: 1
